The Pope in New York

Promoting a prosperous future for all.

There's a buzz in New York these days. Anticipation is high as the date for the visit of Pope Francis to the UN to address the General Assembly on Sept 25 approaches.

Preceding his visit to the US, Pope Francis will issue a papal encyclical on climate change and ecology. In a year of unparalleled importance for climate change because of key UN meetings in Paris this December, he will increase the attention paid to climate change and the environment.

It may seem surprising to some to learn that the Pope will join his voice with the UN which has shown leadership on climate change for the past 20 years. With the encyclical, care of our environment will have a prominent place on the church's agenda for the foreseeable future. The encyclical will not only address the science behind climate change but also the many moral issues behind it

Examining this relationship between God and Creation is at the core of a developed Christian ecotheology, or theology of creation. Earthkeeping is a term being used to describe the nature of our responsibility to care for creation. It springs from our wonder, awe, and gratitude for God's wisdom, creativity, and blessings that fill the natural world.

These are the themes that Pope Francis can be expected to share in his encyclical.

The earth is a gift from God and reflects a divinely ordained beauty and order. Human beings must act as the stewards and protectors of this order. The poor and excluded suffer the worst effects of pollution and climate change. Linking nature's destruction with greed.

Pollution as Structural Sin

St. Francis stressed the importance of protecting our earth home many years ago, and Father Thomas Berry C.P., historian and ecotheologian, continues the same theme: "There is no such

thing as 'human community' without the earth and the soil and the air and the water and all the living forms. Without these, humans do not exist."

The Pope has already spoken of some of "the evils that tear man from the land of his birth." In his words: "Climate change, the loss of biodiversity and deforestation are already showing their devastating effects in the great cataclysms we witness."

We often wonder what we can do to protect our earth. We can initiate, support and take part in the efforts of individuals, organizations and governments to take steps to protect our environment. As a starter, we can plant a garden, and work with others to create places of beauty. Then when the garden is in full bloom we can sit and read the Pope's encyclical!

Our sisters enjoyed the beauty of the spring flowers. There were many young volunteers wearing special jackets so that people could easily identify them for help if needed. Sister Mary John O'Rourke, OSU

Sister Mary John O'Rourke died peacefully at St. Ursula Center, Blue Point, on Friday May 22 after a long illness. She was born in Ozone Park, NY in 1937 and entered the Ursuline Sisters in Blue Point, New York in 1954. She held degrees in History, Education, and Theology.

Sr. Mary John was an exceptional Catholic School principal of St. Gregory the Great School Danbury, Connecticut for 22 years, and a leader in the

Bridgeport Diocese. Sr. Mary John touched the lives of hundreds of children over the years, both as teacher and administrator. She left an indelible mark on the parents and faculty of St. Gregory the Great School, who feel the loss of their beloved principal.

Many tributes were written and spoken in her honor during the wake held at St. Gregory Church on May 28th. The wake was followed by a Funeral Mass attended by an overwhelming crowd of Sisters, friends, families and Diocesan representatives. A reception afterwards gave people time to gather in her memory in a gym dedicated in her honor.

The following day a Mass and burial was held in Blue Point where internment took place in the community cemetery at St. Ursula Center. Sisters, Associates, family and friends prayed for her as they accompanied her to her final resting place in procession.

Sister will be remembered for her optimism and positive spirit. In a recent St. Gregory's School Yearbook she wrote: "Tomorrow is waiting for dreams to be dreamed, goals to be reached. Tomorrow is for you. Let your dreams take you from possibility to reality, from hope to fulfillment. Remember, the future belongs to those who believe in the beauty of their dreams. The world counts on you to open up new possibilities and to discover new ways. Believe in your destiny, and reach your potential."

God's ways are not our ways: The 23rd May, 2015, the eve of Pentecost was a sad day for the sisters of Belgium and for the whole Congregation. Sr. Ann Cuppens, the then Provincial Superior passed away from a car accident. The news spread like wild fire all over Belgium through radio, television and internet. All felt sad and at the same time sympathy for the sisters and family members.

On 29th May, a beautiful and inspiring prayer service was arranged in the Basilica of Scherpenheuvel. A large number of people came to pray for her.

On May 30th the burial Mass took place in the same Basilica. During Mass a representative of Belgium, India, Canada USA, Congo, Ursulines of the Roman Union from England, the Ursulines of Waver and the Ursulines of Hasselt paid their respects to Sr. Ann by placing a white rose on the coffin. The Indian and Congolese sisters expressed their gratitude by singing Hindi and Swahili songs. With gratitude the song of Mary's Magnificat was sung before her mortal remains were laid in the graveyard. All the sisters, family members, friends and parishioners paid their last respects and bid farewell to Sr. Ann with heavy hearts and tears.

Sr. Ann was the youngest sister in the Province. She lived her gifts of love, joy, kindness, loving caring, compassion, simplicity and generosity as she took care of the sisters. Her life reminds us of Jesus' saying. "I have come that they may have life, life in abundance." Sr. Ann gave her abundant life to the province, her family and the people wherever she served. With great love and gratitude we pay our respects to her. May her soul rest in peace.

She has left a remarkable legacy to the Congregation by sharing in writing her wisdom and deep spirituality of the founder Fr. John Lambertz. Whenever we read her reflections we will cherish her memory and go deeper in the spirituality of our founder. May her spirit guide us and inspire us to accomplish God's mission and live in the present moment.

We express our heartfelt gratitude to everyone who encouraged us, supported us and strengthened us through prayers, words of condolence and sympathy.

The sisters in the Belgian Province are grateful for your prayers and support at this great loss. We continue to pray for our sisters in Belgium to help them overcome their pain and sadness.
