Training on Herbal medicine

We, the health team with the support of Catholic Charities organized a training of five days on herbal medicines. Forty participants attended the training. It was intended as a capacity building work shop as well as public education and information that would assure their faith in herbal medicines.



We collected almost all the plants that are available and used all over India, either as food or medicine or both. During the training participants had to identify the medicinal plants and sharing of their knowledge and practical classes to make medicines, like oils and ointments for pain and wounds, syrup and tonics, pills for malaria, jaundice, and diarrhea. Each plant has been described briefly, enlisting its medicinal use and providing guidelines about its administration. After the theory and practical, each one received a certificate.



International Mother Language Day -February 21 Promoting cultural diversity and multilingualism.

International Mother Language Day was first announced by UNESCO in 1999. Due to globalization processes, languages are increasingly under threat, or disappearing altogether. When languages fade, so does the world's rich tapestry of cultural diversity. Opportunities, traditions, memory, unique modes of thinking and expression — valuable resources for ensuring a better future — are also lost.

International Mother Language Day supports "Quality Education" <u>Goal 4 of the</u> <u>Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs)</u>: "Ensure that all youth and a substantial proportion of adults, both men and women, achieve literacy and numeracy.

An example of how language needs of students must be met is illustrated in Danbury High School, the largest high school in the state of Connecticut. Many of the students come from homes in which English is not the dominant spoken language. Therefore, the school offers a wide variety of ESL (English as a Second Language) programs in many different subject areas. Walking through the halls of the school, it is possible to hear over 50 different languages and associated dialects being spoken by the students. The school's culture and classes are definitely enriched by the diverse student population and the experiences they bring to their education.
