I have been wondering what difference a new Pope will make in our violent, fragmented and angry world.

Roman Catholicism has taken a beating in the developed world and is often under persecution in the developing world. The hierarchy of the Church is upholding long held beliefs and practices while the People of God are struggling to keep up with a rapidly changing world. Has the hierarchical Church lost touch with her people?

Pope Francis visited Brazil in July for World Youth Day and, while there, met with the Bishops of Brazil. To the Bishops, Pope Francis said, "Unless we train ministers capable of warming people's hearts, of walking with them in the night, of dialoging with their hopes and disappointments, of mending their brokenness, what hope can we have for our present and future journey?"

"There is a need for increased collegiality ad solidarity, not unanimity, but true unity in the richness of diversity."

"We need a Church capable of rediscovering the maternal womb of mercy. Without mercy we have little chance nowadays of becoming part of a world of "wounded" persons in need of understanding, forgiveness, love."

"Let us not reduce the involvement of the women in the Church, but instead promote their active role in the ecclesial community. By losing women, the Church risks becoming sterile."

Pope Francis' message gave me reason to believe that he does have the potential to make a difference in our world. He is calling the Church back to its roots, to discover again its love of the poor, its simplicity and its compassion.

How do you make a difference as you live your life every day? What is your personal response as you apply the words of Pope Francis to yourself?

Yes, we, Ursuline Sisters of Tildonk have the potential to bring peace, unity and love to our world. We pray to God, Angela Merici, and John Lambertz that this may be so.

On August 24th, 2013 all the Sisters of our Belgian province, along with the associate members and the Congregation Leadership, came together in Floordam, Melsbroek, for a celebration. All the arrangements were



done in a big hall in Floordam in order to provide better care and attention to the needs of our elderly Sisters and to make the day enjoyable to each of them. The participants were 65 in number.



All the six jubilarians of this year were given special attention. Sister Maria De Kinder entered the congregation 80 years ago, Sisters Benigna Cools, Benigna De Maeyer, Els Peeters and Jozefa De Keizer

entered 70 years ago and Sister Ursula Vinkx 60 years ago.

During the beautiful Eucharistic celebration in the quietness of Floordam chapel, we prayed for all the Sisters of our Congregation, in particular for our six jubilarians, for our Sisters in Vice-Province of Congo who are facing the problems of war and for our Canadian Sisters who begin the year of centenary celebration. The Chapel looked grand with gorgeous flowers and lights.

The oneness and the unity we experienced during the celebration of the Eucharist was extended to the big hall. After a little reception, we all enjoyed the graceful dances of our Indian Sisters. Sister Olga from Vice-Province of Congo, who is studying in Rome, was here for summer



holidays. She got herself dressed up in sari and joined Sisters Tina and Lilima in dancing. Meanwhile at the small tables the Sisters and Associates were exchanging their life stories.

For each of the jubilarians a song was composed, in the form of a folk-song or a nursery-rhyme, so all could sing together. It sounded sometimes very funny and it was interesting at the same time. Each of the jubilarians was also presented with flowers and little gifts.

At the end there was tombola and all the participants had pleasant surprises.



After supper, Sister Olga accompanied by Sisters Ghislaine, Bimla, Tina and Lilima closed the day by singing the Magnificat in French.



For the refrain we all were invited to sing together with actions. Our heart was singing out of joy and we were thankful for all who helped in small and big ways to make this day a pleasant and a joyful one.



Quebec City: A Blend of Old and New by Sister Jane Quinlan, OSU

Marie Guyart (Mother Marie of the Incarnation, 1599-1672) has interested me ever since visiting Tours, France, where she

was born and entered the Ursulines. She was among the first Religious Sisters to go to Canada. She founded a school in Quebec which has been in continuous operation since 1639. Marie of the Incarnation, mystic, mother, and missionary, was declared "Blessed" in June, 1980.

This summer for two weeks I was a volunteer assisting the Ursulines in Quebec as a resource person at the "Parloir Marie de l'Incarnation". In the "Parloir", a small



exhibit area, visitors view some personal items, such as her rosary beads, samples of her letters, and a series of paintings depicting her life.

We averaged 20 visitors per day; most followed the tour in French. I gave the tour in English when necessary. I discovered

that many people have a deep interest in Marie's life and writings. Being able to explain her life and



mission was an extremely worthwhile experience for me. The main Museum and Chapel host larger groups. There are several aspects of my time in Quebec that I'd like to share with you concerning the

Ursuline Monastery and Sisters and the history and pageantry of Old Quebec.

The Ursuline Monastery is situated in the "Upper Town" of Quebec and is a spacious well preserved historic building. The chapel is memorable for its ornateness and beauty. The 53 Sisters of this particular




The old part of Quebec has an ancient arch way that adds to the historic nature of the city.

community live in a part of the large complex which houses the school, museum, archives, reception areas and more. It took me a few days to find my way around the appreciated convent. I the Sisters' kindness and gentleness as I tried to navigate from my bedroom on the 4th floor to the Chapel on the 2nd then to the Refectory. I enjoyed the beautiful chanting of the Sisters during the Office and Mass as well as the garden walks and orchard. They were very interested in our Tildonk roots and foundations. These Sisters are from the Ursulines of the Canadian Union. It was a pleasure to get to get to know the Sisters. Each one gave me perspective on Angela's charism and the importance of Marie of the Incarnation in history. My heart has been profoundly touched by their friendship inclusiveness.

Truly the Ursulines are a part of the rich historic fabric that makes up Quebec. I consider them the Guardians of the Heritage of all that concerns Marie of the Incarnation and the other women who followed her through the years. Her letters and other writings explain the early settlement, especially work with the Amerindians, early settlers, Jesuits, and leaders. Her letters political considered important historical documents. Quebec City combines an old European flavor mixed with a modern twist. The terrace boardwalk in front of the Chateau Frontenac, a castle like hotel, is where fire jugglers, jazz musicians, spoon and fiddling players perform for passing tourists. On every corner, there is a historical marker as a reminder of important people and events, including a monument to all the Religious Women who have ministered in Ursulines the city. The and Augustinians who came on the same boat in 1639 headed the list.

A magnificent fireworks display on the last



night in Quebec culminated my memorable two week stay in this lively city. Quebec is a place worth visiting and revisiting.
