International Renewal Program

The International Renewal Program (IRP) was held in De Pelgrim, Scherpenheuvel, from April 6 to 28th, 2018 marking the occasion of the 200th anniversary of the foundation of the Ursuline Sisters of Tildonk. This was an historical event in our Ursuline history.

Thirty participants from Belgium, Congo, India, and US came with great joy and a desire to deepen their spirituality by rekindling the fire of love. The inspiring opening prayer ritual based on 2 Timothy 1: 1-3,5-7,9-11, moved the hearts of every participant and created a conducive climate to enter into the inner journey of renewal/transformation. The ritual highlighted the theme of the program, *Rekindle the fire of love.* The topics were well selected for the program: such as Spirituality, Gospel spirituality, Spirituality of our founders, Charism, Charism of founders, Mission, Reflecting the face of God, Culture, Ut Unum Sint and

Community life. The topics were designed in such a way that they built on one another. The introduction to spirituality and charism were a help in discovering one's personal identity, charism and Ursuline charism and Ursuline culture.

The program was comprised of presentations, reflection questions, and integration days. Pilgrimages to Tildonk, Melsbrook, Sittard, Venray and Hoogstraten allowed us to walk in the footsteps of Fr. John Lambertz.

There was openness, contemplative listening, mutual sharing and receptivity among all the participants. All experienced the presence of our saintly founder and his providential gift of love in every event throughout the Program. The sharing of food from different countries, cultural presentations, small group sharing and faith sharing were a lived experience of our internationality and UT UNUM SINT witnessing unity in diversity. It truly was a cross cultural event. There was no culture or language barrier the among participants. All felt a bond of unity and love of our Ursuline family. Under the insightful and perceptive guidance of our capable facilitator, Mrs. Lucy Abbott from the US, the participants wrote the following statements on Ursuline Charism and Ursuline Culture.


Henri Saintrain's book Jean-Corneille-Martin Lambertz

Thoughts from *Jean-Corneille Martin* Lambertz Parish Priest of Tildonk in Brabant

"One day while discussing the diversity of audiences they (local clergy) were to preach to, some of which, they said, bothered them, while others put them at ease, they asked him if he too this difference experienced of impressions. He answered them at once and with perfect simplicity: "Formerly, and as long as I was preaching myself, yes, I felt all this; but since I have let the Holy Spirit preach through me, I no longer care to know what kind of audience I am dealing with; they are all equal to me; and since then I have also felt that my sermons are bearing more fruit in souls."

In speaking thus, the man of God gave us the secret of the marvellous success of his preaching: it was the Holy Spirit who spoke through his mouth. Thus he sometimes felt himself so consumed by the flame of zeal that one day he said to one of his sisters: "If I had not been able to preach on this occasion my heart would have been broken!" What is more, bringing a good number of misguided souls back to God was not the sole effect of his missions; without his knowing it, the missions made him well known far and wide and drew the attention of the clergy and pious persons to his Institute, whose spirit was thus made known, as well as the good it accomplished for children and youths. In this way a great many young people felt attracted to consecrate themselves to God in this fervent Congregation; hence, many parish priests, wanting to see their flocks benefit from the positive influence of these excellent Sisters, hastened to call them to their parishes."

International Renewal Program Explanation of "Art Statement"

Toward the end of our time together, each prayer group was asked to create an "Art Statement" that illustrated the relationship between personal identity, beliefs, and spirituality and how all of that is held within the Ursuline charism and culture.

We, in Group E, were taken by the image that our Facilitator, Lucy Abbott

Tucker, had earlier presented to us of each one being "one, beautiful, precious drop of water," which, when united together and offering our gifts in mission, can help to water the great tree of life. So in the middle, symbolized by the blue drops, are all

the "beautiful precious" members of the Congregation, their showering unique gifts upon the world. We, in Group E, have named the gifts we each feel called to offer at this time in our lives. There are plenty of unidentified drops for all the other of members the Congregation to claim and name their gifts. Notice that the tears

of suffering in our world - represented by the purple drops - rain down on us because we do not separate ourselves from the world's brokenness and suffering, but allow them to touch and transform us. Indeed, as we Ursulines together offer our unique gifts in service, the suffering of our world is transformed. We stand with our brothers and sisters in their brokenness and are drawn into deeper union with the God who is "Lover of us All." We can do this because of our humble trust in Divine Providence.

Truly, it is because we are grounded in



the lives and examples of Jesus, Angela, John, as well as other holy models compassionate of service - including the "pioneer sisters" who established each of our provinces (all represented by red tongues of flame afire with love) that we can allow the fruits of the Spirit (represented by the

virtues named in orange) to flourish in us and come alive so as to transform and heal our suffering world.
